



Bird Dog a short film by Katrina Whalen



<u>Introduction</u>

Growing up in Wyoming, ten-year-old Rose is happily at home when out on bird hunts with her family. However, when she rises to her older brother's dare and swallows the heart of a mourning dove during a hunt, she begins to worry that the heart in her belly will sprout into a fully formed dove. The burgeoning conviction that she is carrying a bird around in her stomach alters the entire experience of the hunt, and drives her to confront her fears about growing older and shedding her tomboy skin.

Bird Dog is short film about changing roles within a family and the strength that comes from an imagination run wild. Shooting this fall in Wyoming, the project is being produced as writer/director's Katrina Whalen's thesis project for NYU Graduate Film.

Writer / Director's Statement


This is me, back around 1987. I grew up in Casper, Wyoming, a small city that sits where the Great Plains meets the foothills of the Rocky Mountains. Like many families in Wyoming, mine went out on the occasional hunting trip. We had two well-bred dogs who, unfortunately, both failed out of hunting school. One was gun shy, the other was just not interested. So, as I was the youngest member of my family (one not particularly able to or



interested in firing guns), I decided the best solution would be to serve as my dad's human bird dog.

I'd go out with him on the annual bird hunts, walk through the harvested wheat fields, wait for him to shoot a bird. I would run out into the open landscape, find the bird, and retrieve it. It was a wonderful way to explore new terrains, and a great way to bond with him and the other families along for the trip. And I thought this was totally normal — at least until I went out beyond the state lines and told some friends about it. They were suitably shocked and confused.

A few months ago, after a conversation with a young niece of mine, I started thinking about my old bird dogging days. I'm now a graduate student at New York University's film school, finishing up a degree in writing and directing. Over the last few years I've been increasingly interested in the telling of western stories, and this strange perspective on life and death seemed to me like something to explore. I sat down and wrote an early draft of the script for 'Bird Dog' – a script from the perspective of a young girl who is eagerly witnessing this western way of life and discovering the ways that families come together around such traditions. Drawing inspiration from such films



as Robert Mulligan's 'To Kill a Mockinbird', Ken Loach's 'Kes', Lynne Ramsay's 'Ratcatcher', and Victor Erice's 'Spirit of the Beehive', it is a coming of age story that develops outside of those more commonly shown in our current culture, an important one that I believe needs to be told.

I'm now very excited by the opportunity to bring this script to life. I'm looking forward to creating the imaginative perspective of the main character of Rose, using both live action narrative and stop-motion animation. And most importantly, I am thrilled to be working with my friends and family to shoot the film in the same locations that originally gave birth to this story.

Originally from Wyoming, Katrina Whalen is an independent filmmaker now based in New York. While attending Yale University as an undergraduate, she was awarded the school's top prize for her work in filmmaking and animation. She has spent the last ten years working in film, television, and web production around the country, with a resume as a factotum that includes work on 'Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind', 'Synecdoche, New York', Julie Taymor's 'The Tempest', 'Jimmy P: Psychotherapy of a Plains Indian', and the indie circuit hit 'Fort Tilden. She is currently enrolled as a Dean's Fellow in NYU's Graduate Film Program. Her own short films have played at festivals from Los Angeles to Istanbul.

Mollye Asher is a NY based independent Producer and Director. Her feature producing debut Faith, Love, and Whiskey, premiered at the 2012 Slamdance Film Festival and won Best Narrative Feature at the 2012 Dallas International Film Festival. Most recently, Mollye is the producer of Fort Tilden, which won the Grand Jury Prize at SXSW 2014 and the Special Jury Prize at the IFFBoston. She is also a producer on She's Lost Control which had its World Premiere at the 2014 Berlinale, US Premiere at the 2014 SXSW and NY Premiere at the New Directors/ New Films. Mollye is a Film Independent Fast Track Fellow, IFP Narrative Lab fellow and an alumn of the NYU Graduate Film program.

Laura Moss has worked as a designer and special effects artist for the past seven years. She has worked for HBO, MTV, CBS, The History Channel and Nickelodeon. Laura is also the artistic director of Quo Vadimus Arts, a non-profit organization dedicated to cross-cultural exchange. She has lived in Jerusalem where she worked for the Palestinian National Theatre. Laura is an M.F.A. candidate at NYU's Tisch School of the Arts, and has designed films and commercials in New York, Louisiana, and the Czech Republic.
